## Publication of IIJG Researches

Over the last seven years, the Institute has sponsored almost 20 projects, mainly in realm of pure research, usually inter-disciplinary in nature and, to a lesser extent, in the category of tools and technologies for the Jewish family historian.

The range of these studies has been quite remarkable both in terms of time and space – from 14th and 15th century Spain and the Mediterranean Basin, through early-modern Italy, 18th and 19th century Hungary and late Ottoman Palestine, to pre-World War I Lithuania and inter-war Latvia, up to and including Europe as a whole during the Shoah. The results of the researches have in most cases been posted on the Institute's Website (at <a href="http://iiig.org/research">http://iiig.org/research</a>. However, the time has now come to publish the best of them in a printed collection of IIJG researches for use in private and university libraries.

The cost of such a volume, containing 10-12 studies, will be approximately \$7,000,
